



INSCRIBED TWICE BY PEARY on dedication-page and again on a portrait illustration of Peary, both dated 30 November 1913. ALSO SIGNED BY THEODORE ROOSEVELT on the introductionpage dated 28 February 1912. In the introduction, Roosevelt recounts his time aboard Peary's ship on the eve of his final effort to reach the North Pole. Roosevelt would later receive news from a native runner that he indeed discovered it, which the former president would hail in his introduction as being "one of the great feats of our time".

FIRST EDITION. In 1829, Ross set out on his second expedition in the small paddle-steamer *Victory* with his nephew James Clark Ross who was second-in-command. The second voyage was much more successful than his first: "The expedition survived four winters in the Arctic, during which James Clark Ross discovered the North Magnetic Pole" (Hill).







FIRST ENGLISH EDITION. "Translation of Arago's *Promenade autour du monde...* The Uranie, with a crew of 125 men under the command of Captain Louis de Freycinet, entered the Pacific from the West to make scientific observations on geography, magnetism, and meteorology. Arago was the artist of the expedition, which visited Western Australia, Timor, Hawaii, and New South Wales." (Hill). First published in French in 1822, the English publication is the rarer and "much prized" edition.

FIRST EDITION of one of the finest illustrated books on Afghanistan depicting a selection of views during the First Anglo-Afghan War of what was then an unexplored country. Atkinson was a surgeon in the Bengal service and was chosen as Superintending Surgeon to the Army of the Indus as they marched to Kabul in 1839. Atkinson was relieved shortly after the surrender of Dost Mohammed and returned to Bengal in 1841, escaping the fate which awaited the occupying British Indian force.



FIRST EDITION. Alexander Beatson was an agriculturalist and officer in the East India Company's service, and he served as governor of St. Helena, He wrote this book in an effort to alter contemporary views of the island's fertility and potential. At the time experts believed that St Helena was barren and with no productive potential. After spending several years on St. Helena, Beatson became convinced that its lack of production was due to flaws in technique rather than natural endowment. In making his case, Beatson describes the history of St Helena's geological formation, its soil and climate conditions, minerals and potential for vegetable production, as well as the qualities of the island that lend it to military purposes. Beatson's appointment as governor of St Helena was from 1808 to 1813. During this period, Beatson introduced a better system of cultivation and made many improvements to the island of St Helena.




FIRST EDITION. Beaver participated in this British mission aiming for a colonization of the island of Bulama near Sierra Leone. The expedition was badly executed and a failure. "Beaver endeavored, by unceasing toil, to keep a little order and to promote a little industry; but the men were quite unfitted for the work and manner of life, and the greater number of them died. The miserable remnants of the party evacuated the island and went to Sierra Leone, whence Beaver obtained a passage to England." (ODNB). Gay 3196.

FIRST EDITION, of Bell's account of his remarkable journey from St. Petersburg through Siberia and into China on behalf of the Russian tsar. Bell's narrative includes detailed descriptions of the manners, customs, geography and scenery in the countries visited. Bell departed St Petersburg on July 15, 1715 and proceeded to Moscow, and from there to Kazan and south along the Volga to Astrakhan. The mission then sailed down the Caspian Sea to Derbent and traveled on to Esfahan in Persia, where they arrived on March 14, 1717. They left Esfahan on September 1 and returned to St Petersburg via Saratov on December 30, 1718. Bell's account of the journey to Kazan and through Siberia to China is possibly the most complete and interesting part of his travels. Of particular note are his descriptions of the Dalai Lama and the Chinese wall, and his residence in Peking.

Hand tinted lithograph after Bull by Walker, 432 x 654 mm, laid down on archival paper, image toned, some browning to margins, few professional repairs to lower margin and image.

A RARE ENGRAVING BY AN AUSTRALIAN PRISONER. In 1845 while visiting London. Bull was arrested for "feloniously making part of a foreign note for 100 dollars". Bull was sentenced to 14 years deportation to Australia and in May 1846 he left London aboard the prison ship John Calvin where he was given an opportunity to paint during the journey (See The Wreck of the Waterloo at Cape Town in 1842, now hanging in The Mitchell Library in Sydney). In 1847, he was transferred to the penal colony Saltwater River, Tasmania where he spent several years in Hobart. On 8 December 1850, Bull absconded to Melbourne from Hobart Town under the assumed name Thomas Evans. He would later be recaptured on 22 January 1851 and sentenced to only 20 days solitary confinement. After his release in 1853, Bull was considered the only professional landscape painter in Hobart, noted for his scenes of early colonial Hobart from 1853 and 1856. His most notable being the City of Hobart Town oil painting done in 1854. Walker published this painting as a tinted lithograph in 1855 and in 1859, 53 of the prints supplemented with statistical details of the colony were framed in muskwood and huron pine and sent to London to encourage emigration to Tasmania. OCLC locates only one copy institutionally (National Library of Australia). Bull is still regarded as a pioneer of Australian landscape painting.

FIRST EDITION, of Burton's 1877-78 second expedition into the Midian, which, like his first in 1877 ("The Gold Mines of Midian" published in 1878), was financed by the Khedive in Cairo as a search for gold. He mapped a 600-mile route through the northern and southern Midian recording its ruined ancient cities. For the Khedive in Cairo he brought back twenty-five tons of minerals to be assayed. Includes two additional appendices and alterations from the first edition published in 1855–56.



FIRST ENGLISH EDITION. Jean Chappe d'Auteroche was a French astronomer who was sent to Siberia for the purpose of observing the transit of Venus. The Transit was due in June 1761 and was considered to have great scientific importance since theoretically it could be used to estimate the size of the solar system. From St Petersburg Chappe d'Auteroche sledged to Tobolosk, where he spent several months, observing the Transit of Venus and carrying out a large number of related scientific measurements. After his return, he published his *Voyage en Siberie* (1768). Chappe D'Auteroche describes Siberia's geography, natural history, and the culture of its inhabitants – their manners and customs; He also sharply condemns Russia's political regime.

"Hakluyt's Principall Navigations was the fruit of a life devoted to promoting the cause of English colonization and commerce by disseminating knowledge about, and stimulating interest in, all the less known or recently discovered parts of the world. This great repository of explorations, travels, and adventures 'within the compasse of these 1500 years' was aptly styled by Mr. Froude 'the prose epic of the modern English nation'" (Church). The Supplement "contains fourteen rare works not easily accessible in any other form, and is quite as important as either of the volumes published in [Hakluyt's] time" (Sabin 29600). "In a word, many of such useful tracts of sea adventures, which before were scattered as several ships, Mr. Hakluyt hath embodied into a fleet, divided into three squadrons so many several volumes; a work of great honour to England" (Thomas Fuller, The History of the Worthies of England).

It is believed that the two men went on to falsify more than one hundred Lincoln documents as well as signatures of numerous other famous figures including Mark Twain, Rudyard Kipling and Theodore Roosevelt.

THE EXTRAORDINARILY RARE SECOND EDITION that was the very first copy to be appear in the rooms in 1909 at the Clarence H. Clark sale that up until recently (see Ira A. Lipman sale at Sotheby's, 13 April 2021, which erroneously described their copy as being this Clarence H. Clark copy), held the title as being the last and only copy offered at auction in over a century. Four editions were printed in 1779 all of which are extremely rare. The Philadelphia edition printed by Bell is designated by Evans as the first edition and this Boston printing is called by him the second edition. There has never been a copy of the Bell edition offered for sale, and the North American Imprints Projects locates only two copies of that edition- "it is so rare as to be virtually unobtainable. This edition is almost as rare" (Reese). OCLC locates only 3 copies of the present edition in institutional holdings.

Ethan Allen was the leader of the Green Mountain Boys, who led a movement to nullify New York's authority over the region. But after Lexington and Concord, Allen led his makeshift militia in a surprise attack on Fort Ticonderoga, taking control of Lake Champlain and gaining admittance of the Green Mountain Regiment to the Continental Army. "Allen joined General Richard Montgomery's staff as a recruiter, enlisting Indians and Québecois to join the forces invading Canada. In a daring effort to capture a weakly defended Montreal with an equally small force of New Englanders and Québecois, Allen was taken prisoner by the British. Over the next two years he suffered a brutal captivity in British prisons, aboard prison ships, and in the New York City jail. Thanks to the efforts of his family, Allen's cruel treatment at the hands of the British became a cause célèbre. Finally exchanged in May 1778 for Lieutenant Colonel Archibald Campbell, Allen wrote a narrative of his captivity that lacerated the British as vindictive monsters [the subtitle of his memoir references "the Destruction of the Prisoners at New York, by General Sir William Howe"] while calling on Americans to forsake any thought of compromise. Allen's Narrative ... was an enormous success, going through eight editions in two years, and is rated second among best-selling books of the revolutionary period after Thomas Paine's Common Sense" (Michael Bellesiles in American National Biography).

Their commander, Theodore Harvey Barrett, holds the distinction of commanding Union forces at the Battle of Palmito Ranch on May 12-13, 1865 - the last battle of the U.S. Civil War. As the war's end neared Lt. Col. Richard Foster, who had been involved with John Brown's anti-slavery efforts in Kansas, established an educational program for illiterate African American soldiers which he would expand into the Lincoln Institute following the Confederacy's defeat. Later the Lincoln Institute would be integrated into Missouri's university system and renamed Lincoln University. Among its famous alumni are Lloyd L. Gaines, Moddie Taylor, and Oliver Lake.

In addition to being a noted lawyer, philanthropist, conservationist, and writer, Madison Grant was a vocal proponent of eugenics, immigration restrictions, and antimiscegenation laws, thus creating a problematic legacy for a man who, though a key figure in the conservation movement, also directly influenced the perpetrators of some of the greatest human rights atrocities in the whole of human history.

Madison Grant counted among his direct descendants Jesse de Forest, who in 1623 organized the first band of settlers in what was then New Netherland, Richard Treat, one of the first Puritan settlers in the New World, and Robert Treat Paine, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. Being born into a wealthy and notable American family immediately qualified Grant for admission into the inner sanctums of New York society, and he counted among his close friends a small, sickly boy named Theodore Roosevelt. The narrative of "race suicide" became an extremely popular one amongst the American elite following the end of the Civil War, and as the nineteenth century gave way to the twentieth ever more pseudo-scientific means were deployed to persuade and ultimately directly influence public policy against integration not only of former slaves but also of Jews, Catholics, Asians, immigrants, and the mentally disabled. Grant's passion for the maintenance of natural spaces was also rooted in the

need for "purity," and he was a constant voice in the ear of close friend and fellow conservationist President Theodore Roosevelt when Roosevelt signed legislation which effectively created the National Parks system.

What Grant succeeded in doing was taking multiple strands of pseudo-scientific race theory outlined in countless books published in the United States and Europe and weaving them into a single narrative, which he then published in 1916 as *The Passing of the Great Race*. The book was praised by Theodore Roosevelt, Warren G. Harding, Calvin Coolidge, and Adolf Hitler, who called it "my Bible." One of the men who reached out to Grant following publication of *The Passing of the Great Race* was a representative from the state of Washington, Albert Johnson, and through Johnson Grant saw many like-minded allies installed into positions of power within the United States government; among them was Harry Laughlin, who Johnson named as The Committee on Immigration's "expert eugenics agent."

In 1924 Congress passed the Johnson-Reed Act, also known as the Immigration Act. This law further worsened the alreadytense relationship between the United States and Japan and contributed greatly to the Jewish refugee crisis of the 1930s and 40s; both would become key issues as the United States was drawn into the conflict then engulfing Europe and threatening to consume the entire globe. Grant would continue to be cited as an influence by the Nazi regime throughout its short existence. He died mere months before he was to join Prime Minister Hermann Goering at the International Hunting Exhibition in Berlin, an event which Grant himself helped to organize.







ONE OF THE EARLIEST AND MOST IMPORTANT OBTAINABLE MAPS OF THE GREAT LAKES AND THE HEADWATERS OF THE MISSISSIPPI. Drawing upon the reports of the fur-traders and the Jesuit Missionaries such as Joliet, Marquette, Hennepin, La Salle, and Allouez, Coronelli's map shows the northern part of the French trans-Appalachian territory of Louisiana and a remarkably accurate outline of the Great Lakes which is considered "the best separate map of the five lakes published during the seventeenth century" (Goss). The map also draws upon earlier and important printed maps such as Jean Baptiste Louis Franquelin's map of 1681 and the so-called "Jesuit Relation" map of 1672, which mapped Lake Superior in considerable detail.

Based on Coronelli's and Jean Baptiste Nolin's earlier *Partie Occidentale du Canada ou de la Nouvelle France* first published in 1687 and being almost unobtainable, this map is a slightly reduced version, solely focusing on the Great Lakes – the first map to do so. The Coronelli–Nolin map was the first printed map devoted to the Great Lakes and upper Mississippi region and would remain "the definitive map of the region for over fifty years" (Burden) until the Charlevoix/Bellin map of 1744. Their map of this region is the finest portrayal since Nicolas Sanson's *Amerique Septentrionale* in 1650, only requiring little improvement in Lakes Michigan and Huron. For the first time in print, the north shore of Lake Erie shows the three peninsulas. At its southern point is *Chekagou R Portage*, the first mention of the name on a printed map which would later become present day Chicago. The upper reaches of the Mississippi are here named as *F. Colbert, ò Mechissipi*, the name *Mechissipi* being derived from an Indian name used by Jacques Marquette in the text of his diaries of the explorations in 1672–1673.



First issued in *Memoires de l'Amerique Septentrionale ou la Suite des Voyages* in 1703, the map emphasizes the importance of the river trading routes showing the Ottawa River joining the Abitibi River and the relationship of the whole of the northwest part of the map is "completely confused...but nevertheless, it is the first map of Canada that was generally available to the public and was one the defined, at least for the southern and eastern parts of the country, the fur-trading routes. It is perhaps this aspect that captured the imagination of Lahontan's readers, and which led to the obvious popularity of the book and its numerous printings" (Kershaw).

Lahontan's maps and most notably the map showing a western river extending to the Pacific, were among the most influential of all mythical cartographic works of North America, affecting the cartographic landscape of the upper Mississippi, Plains and Rocky Mountain regions for nearly 50 years. The map depicts the Longue flowing from the mountains in the west (Rocky Mountains), home to the Gnacsitares Indians and connecting to the Mississippi River. On the western side of the mountains is another river, presumably flowing into the Pacific. Lahontan's concept, although being mostly fictional, was enormously influential, and was copied by virtually all 18th-century cartographers, including Moll, Senex, Popple and De L'isle, thus perpetuating the myth. The English colonies in New England are identified as are New York, Manhattan, Montreal, Quebec, and Boston. The future site of Chicago is identified as the "Portage de Chegakou v des Illinois".

The maps depict the newly negotiated land and water boundaries from Lake Earie down the St. Clair River and across Lake Huron to the eastern part of the Upper Peninsula. 3 of the 8 maps are devoted to the boundary at Detroit. Each map is "shaded on the British side with red, and on the American side with blue" with information about the commissioners and surveyors (Decision of the Commissioners). The boundary was negotiated and finalized at Utica, New York in 1822, and this report was issued 6 years later. "Neither the series nor individual maps are recorded in Phillips or Karpinski. The only copy located by the Union Catalog is in the U. S. State Department Library. This folio edition is not to be confused with the octavo edition that consists only of text" (Streeter). 6 of the 8 maps are indeed listed in Karpinski, each in separate entries meaning Karpinski must have only seen this folio disbound and incomplete.



The Chisholm Massacre took place on April 29, 1877, in Kemper County, Mississippi. Three days before, Sheriff John William Gully was murdered near the home of William Wallace Chisholm, Gully's predecessor as sheriff. During the Civil War Chisholm had been a staunch Unionist, and during Reconstruction had been an ardent defender of the rights of former slaves, who were credited with keeping him in office. Chisholm's wife Emily, three sons, and his daughter accompanied their father to the jailhouse after a warrant was issued for his arrest, with a friend named Angus McLellan standing guard. Within hours McLellan was dismissed by order of the new sheriff, and upon leaving the jail was confronted by a mob of over 300 members of the Ku Klux Klan, who shot McLellan on the spot and then stormed the jail. William, his thirteen year-old son John, and his seventeen year-old daughter Cornelia were killed, along with one of their attackers. Though the mob's leaders were indicted none were formally punished, and local papers justified their actions by claiming that Chisholm had been party to Gully's murder. Seven months later a former slave named Walter Riley confessed to Gully's murder, claiming that it was carried out in retaliation for Gully's policies towards African Americans. After being sentenced to death for the crime Riley escaped and was recaptured shortly afterwards while hiding in the gin house on the Chisholm plantation, armed with pistols that had belonged to William Wallace Chisholm and guarded by Chisholm's two surviving sons. Emily Chisholm passed away on October 4, 1904, and was interred beside her husband, son and daughter. 400/600

Raynal's Revolution of America is excerpted from the Geneva 1780 edition of his Histoire philosophique et politique. The French edition and the English translation were likely both printed in London and issued simultaneously; both were reprinted several times before the first authorized English edition of 1782. The work elicited a response from Thomas Paine, who "objected to Raynal's claims that the war arose entirely from a dispute over taxation and that peace efforts had been hampered by the Americans' alliance with France. His Letter... is an exemplary piece of diplomacy" (DNB). Wilkes' newspaper The North Briton included satirical attacks on the Earl of Bute, George III's Prime minister, and reflected many of the debates over Britain's relationship with the American colonies. Leonard's Massachusettensis was the "most influential early Tory attempt to defend England's conduct" (Howes).

In Wright's *Autobiography* (1943), the architect speaks of Alec as being "the kindest, most generous man I know."

By 1921 when all six of the original volumes were available, the complete set was offered in a cardboard house. The next three volumes, comprising My Travelship, were added in 1926, and the wooden book house was then offered only occasionally as a special promotion. Only 100 were ever produced. The Book House for Children was remarkable for its large female staff, at a time when most women did not work outside of the home. "The utilization of women in all phases of its business activity was one of the unique aspects of The Book House for Children. Not only was there an all-woman sales force but the majority of the employees were women." (Taylor: Olive Beaupre Miller and The Book House for Children).



The Reverends Addie and Claude Wyatt, Jr. were fixtures of the American Civil Rights movement through the second half of the 20th century. Addie began her career working with the Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America in Chicago in 1941. Together they founded Chicago's Vernon Park Church of God in 1956, and for the next twelve years were closely associated with Dr. Martin Luther King's peace movement, joining him at the March on Washington in 1963, the Selma to Montgomery Marches in 1965, and the Chicago demonstration in 1966. In the early 1960s Eleanor Roosevelt appointed Addie to a position on the Labor Legislation Committee on the United States Commission on the Status of Women. A vital force in the arena of labor rights, she founded the Coalition of Labor Union Women in 1974. The following year she and Barbara Jordan became the first African American women to be honored as Persons of the Year by Time Magazine. Claude Wyatt, Jr. served as the Southern Christian Leadership Conference's Chicago director of the Ministerial Leadership Movement and as a board member of People United to Serve Humanity (PUSH).


Sydney Harris worked for nearly half a century as a photographer, activist, and union organizer with a focus on civil rights. During the Spanish Civil War he served as a scout with the Abraham Lincoln Brigade, and upon his return to American shores he devoted himself to the cause of equal rights in the United States. During the 1950s he was labeled a subversive by the U.S. government and was subject to surveillance for many years after, his associations with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr and Cesar Chavez gaining him extra scrutiny throughout the 1960s.
