1. ADAMS, Richard (1920-2016). Watership Down. New York: Macmillan Publishing Co., [1972].

Large 8vo. Original cloth-backed boards; original dust jacket.

FIRST AMERICAN EDITION, INSCRIBED BY ADAMS on the titlepage. Adams's first novel Watership Down was initially turned down by the major publishing houses, before publication by Rex Collings in 1972, and it was quickly established as a major work of British post-war literature. Sales exceeded 100,000 copies in the first year, and Adams was awarded both the Carnegie Medal and the Guardian Award for children's fiction. It was also the source of numerous adaptations for film and television including the 1978 British animated adventuredrama that was nominated for the Hugo Award for Best Dramatic Presentation.

The University of Arizona Special Collections lists the work as being one of the 100 "essential books" for the state's Centennial.

This film was nominated for several Academy Awards and won for Best Picture, Best Actor (for Rod Steiger), Best Screenplay based on material from another source, Best Editing and more.






This novel, the fictionalized account of his boyhood in Shanghai during World War II, was the basis of the 1987 film, starring Christian Bale and John Malkovich, directed by Stephen Spielberg, and with a screenplay by Tom Stoppard. It garnered several Academy Award nominations.





Benchley later regretted writing the original book as it encouraged a widespread fear of sharks. He would spend the rest of his life promoting the cause of ocean conservation. 400/600









The Hound of Death, Moving Finger and Curtain are the sources of various episodes of several television series (both The Agatha Christie Hour and various Miss Marple series). More importantly, The Hound of Death contains the short story, Witness for the Prosecution, which has been adapted several times for film and television, most notably the 1957 mystery film starring Charles Laughton and Marlene Dietrich, directed by Billy Wilder. It was nominated for several awards, including Best Actor (BAFTAS) for Charles Laughton.



Paul Brooks of Houghton Mifflin, later to be named editor-inchief, "fell for Mr. Bilbo Baggins and his crew" despite negative criticism by the editor in charge of children's books at his firm and the children's librarian at the Boston Public Library, whose professional opinion was consulted. Unlike Allen & Unwin who published The Hobbit without illustrations, Houghton Mifflin wanted to include color illustrations by American artists in addition to Tolkien's line drawings, but Allen & Unwin advised Tolkien that "it would be better if all the illustrations were from your hand".

Despite Tolkien's hesitations of his illustrations looking "rather silly", he finally agreed to let Houghton Mifflin "do what seems good to them- as long [as] it was possible (I should like to add) to veto anything from or influenced by the Disney studios (for all whose work I have a heartfelt loathing)". Two of these color illustrations were reproduced on the dust jacket, which Houghton Mifflin preferred to Tolkien's first design on the dust jacket, which they felt had a "British look". This rare dust jacket is now considered more desirable than the first British edition jacket as fewer have survived and is almost never to be found on the market. The Hobbit was later adapted into three films directed by Peter Jackson from 2012-2014, becoming one of the highest-grossing film series of all time. Hammond A3b.

Considered the rarest and most prestigious honor bestowed by the Academy, as there have only been 39 recipients to date. Adler was an American film producer and production head for 20th Century Fox studios. In 1954, his production of From Here to Eternity, based on James Jones' 1951 debut novel of the same name, won the Academy Award for Best Picture. Adler also produced the 1956 film Bus Stop, starring Marilyn Monroe. This is the first Thalberg designed by Rocchi in 1957 to be awarded and is the same design used today. Quiet as it's kept, there were no marigolds in the fall of 1941. We thought, at the time, that it was because Pecola was having her father's baby that the marigolds did not grow. 
Provenance: originally from the library of Owen Wister Jr. (1860-1938). Wister was an American writer that was considered the "father" of western fiction, remembered for authoring the bestselling 1902 novel The Virginian. He became friends with Hemingway in the late 1920s and the two would correspond profusely after. Hemingway would seek professional advice from Wister including Scribner's handling of omissions in the serialization of A Farewell to Arms. To which Wister responds: "Magazines have a special responsibility. They're subscribed for. But nobody's obliged to buy a book. So put it in the book and never mind the magazine" (27 February 1929). Hemingway would also speak very highly of the writer, including one letter to his editor at Charles Scribner's, Maxwell Perkins, 12 February 1928, describing one of Wister's stories as "wonderfully good" and a "lesson to our generation in how to write". In another dated 1 March 1929, he wishes Wister were criticizing his new book, A Farewell to Arms, as he did in his earlier work, In Our Time: "You see I have great respect for your opinion because you can write the same story I would write and write it very much better". When Wister visited Hemingway in 1929, and after reviewing the galleys of A Farewell to Arms, Hemingway writes to Perkins that Wister "agreed there was no change to be made in the last chapter and has read this ending and like it very much" his last words being "don't touch a thing!". In a following letter to Perkins, 31 October 1929, Hemingway requests that one of the presentation copies of A Farewell to Arms be sent to Owen Wister with his compliments (see selected letters, p. 312).

In 1922, Koji and Masai Watanabe emigrated to California. During WWII, the couple was interned at Manzanar concentration camp in 1942, where they remained until 1945 when the war was over.
