
FIRST EDITION, second (i.e. American) issue, comprising sheets of the suppressed 1865 printing of Alice with new title-page; the variant (no priority) with the "B" in "By" aligned between the "T" and "E" of "Tenniel" on the title-page, and without the hyphen in "Rabbit Hole" on the Contents leaf. "This second issue comprises those copies of the first edition still unbound when Lewis Carroll decided in July 1865 to cancel the edition. In 1866 the copies on hand were sold to Appleton, and [1000] new title-pages were printed at Oxford, replacing the originals. The binding was evidently done in England, duplicating that for the first issue except in the substitution of Appleton's name for Macmillan at the foot of the spine and in the omission of a [Burn & Co.] binder's ticket. Textually the Appleton issue agrees with the Macmillan 1865, the only difference being the cancel title-page" (Lewis Carroll at Texas: The Warren Weaver Collection, 2). RARE IN ORIGINAL CLOTH. 
SECOND EDITION (i.e. FIRST AUTHORIZED EDITION) and First Published English Edition, earliest state with the inverted "S" in the last line of the Contents page. For this new edition published November 1865 (but dated 1866 for the Christmas market) the book was re-set by the printer Richard Clay from a copy of the suppressed 1865 *Alice*, forming the basis for all future Macmillan editions.

PRESENTATION COPY, INSCRIBED BY DODGSON TO BRITISH ILLUSTRATOR RICHARD DOYLE (1824-1883) on the half-title using his real name which is exceedingly rare as Dodgson was careful to protect his privacy and to prevent his serious mathematical works from being linked with his books for children. As early as August 1866 Dodgson entertained the thought of writing a sequel to *Alice*'s *Adventur*es which would use up what he remembered of several more stories told to the three Liddell girls. Dodgson had difficulty finding an artist to illustrate the work as Tenniel refused to do it, insisting that one book by Lewis Carroll was all he felt, in 1866, that he could stand. Dodgson then visited the artists of the day, beginning with Doyle (well-known for being the uncle of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, author of the Sherlock Holmes stories) at the advice from Tenniel (see Handbook p. 63), who in the year prior (1866) was sent this presentation copy of *Alice* (see Letters, p. 36 footnote). In one of his diary entries dated 24 January 1867, Dodgson wrote: "Called on [Richard] Doyle, and discussed the idea of his illustrating *Alice* [i.e. *Through the Looking-Glass*: Dodgson generally found his artist before writing his book]. He seems willing to undertake it, but not certain that he could get them done by next Christmas. We left the matter unsettled for the present" (see Diaries p. 249). Dodgson ultimately decided that "Tenniel is the man", and in June 1868 Tenniel consented to illustrate it.


PRESENTATION COPY, INSCRIBED BY THE ILLUSTRATOR JOHN TENNIEL WITH AN ORIGINAL DRAWING ON THE HALF-TITLE: "With [monogram] JT's kind regards / Xmas 1867" underneath which is a reverse image drawing of A38 (the woodcut appearing on p. 170) showing the Mad Hatter with tea-cup and toast. ONE OF ONLY 5 KNOWN COPIES OF DRAWINGS MADE BY TENNIEL AS PART OF INSCRIPTIONS IN BOOKS according to Schiller's 1990 census (this is letter "b" on that list) but one of only 2 copies of an original Tenniel drawing in an 1866 Alice.


A UNIQUE COPY, with no other drawings of this version of the Mad Hatter (A38) listed in that census of presentation copies. It is reproduced in Frances Sarzano's 1948 monograph on *Sir John Tenniel*, in the series "English Masters of Black-and-White," p. 57, where it is identified as the property of H.M. Lingford; this was sold at Sotheby's London as part of his important "Lewis Carroll" library, 6 November 1952, as lot 201.


In 1863, Dodgson began contemplating whether he should publish his story of *Alice* but was doubtful of how it would be received. His friend Robinson Duckworth, who was present on the original boating expedition where Alice's adventures were first told, reassured him that it would be successful just so long as he could persuade "some good artist to illustrate it", and suggested John Tenniel who drew excellent cartoons of animals in *Punch*. The two were introduced on 25 January 1864 and shortly after Tenniel wrote back telling Dodgson that he was up to the task. "As Dodgson could not illustrate his stories himself, he did the next best thing, he employed an expert artist to make the illustrations which he could see in his own mind but lacked the skill to reproduce on paper, paying for the work himself and, so far as possible, 'using' the artist as if he were a piece of machinery hired for the purpose. This explains why Tenniel's illustrations are so much a part of the two Alice books that no other artist has ever come near to equaling them" (Green, *Lewis Carroll* pp. 42-43).



In Dodgson's Diaries, the author met Mr. and Mrs. Francis Holiday on 2 September 1884 and later stayed with his "new friends" on 9 February 1885. Lovett 178; Williams-Madan-Green-Crutch 194.

THE "ORIGINAL ALICE'S" OWN COPY OF THE FIRST EDITION OF NABOKOV'S VALUABLE RUSSIAN TRANSLATION, SIGNED BY ALICE HARGREAVES on the front pastedown. "This important translation into Russian was prepared by Nabokov at the age of 24 while an undergraduate at Cambridge. His faithful yet imaginative version of Dodgson's text has made it one of the most successful renderings of Alice into another language" (Justin G. Schiller Sale). To make the story relevant for a Russian audience, Nabokov retold it in a Russian style and gave Alice a new name: "Ania", perhaps to avoid the perceived German origin of the name Alice (a country that was unpopular at that time in Russia) or to avoid the name of the Empress Alexandra Fedorovna (Alix of Hesse), wife of tsar Nicholas II, infamously murdered by the Bolsheviks in July 1918.

Since its publication, many attempts at translating Alice had been previously made but all were met with the difficulty of translating Dodgson's wordplay, nonsense verse, and mathematical and logical puzzling. Nabokov's faithful rendering of the English text, using deliberate distortions of the characters' names and nursery rhymes - now considered the best translation - was the work of a young novelist whose reputation for literary playfulness would ultimately rival Dodgson's. His connection with the two Alice works at a young age would become the building material for his prose, and the ironic association for the author who coined the word "nymphet", in his masterpiece: *Lolita*. "The Alice-books must have influenced Nabokov chiefly and directly in the formation of seeing things in abstract ways and absurd forms... One of the fundamental relationships between Alice's fairy-tale world and Nabokov's *oeuvre* is the permanent presence of other worlds, other dimensions, the multi-layered interpretation of this world and the beyond, and the possibility of crossing the border between the two" (see Zsuzsa, *The Carroll Carroll Pattern. Nabokov and Lewis Carrol*).

THIS IMPORTANT TRANSLATION IS NOW "ALMOST AS RARE AS THE SUPPRESSED FIRST EDITION OF CARROLL'S OWN ALICE" (see Morgan/Houghton). "Within twenty years of its publication, copies of [this] translation [...] would be deemed rarities. [Nobokov] later attributed his invitation to teach at Wellesley in 1941 in part to the fact that they had this edition in their Lewis Carroll collection" (Funke, p.47). Nabokov's translation is now "one of the most sought-after of all translations - certainly as highly valued as the early Carroll-inspired creations" (Goodacre, The Real Flood of Translations in Alice in a World of Wonderlands, p. 103).

"On receiving your violent & passionate letter this morning, I immediately telegraphed to my printer in London (who I thought must be to blame in the matter) the following message 'O.W.H.H.' (I need hardly tell you that those letters are always understood by the Telegraph Company to mean 'Off With His Head') and in less than an hour I received the following answer 'I.I.D.' (you know of course that these letters stand for 'It Is Done'). However, I found afterwards that he had not been so much in fault as I supposed, & I regretted having sent such hasty order - but let us quit this painful subject".

The remainder of the letter contains a self-consciously sober and systematic discussion ("you had better rub up your spectacles, & drink a little 'eau sucre' to get your head clear - ahem!") of photographs taken by Dodgson of the recipient and her family, and of the orders made for them, since Gina has accused him of failing to send an order of which he has no note, and in one case of a photograph he cannot remember. Dodgson accordingly lists the ten photographs he took, and the two orders he has since received, noting also that Gina's mother has given him permission to give a photograph to his close friend Robert Godfrey Faussett in Oxford who however "finds himself quite unable to decide which he likes best", and a proposal that Gina bring her baby sister to Oxford to be photographed the next summer: "I took a baby of about that age there last summer (it was a grand-daughter of Dr Pusey) & we managed it by bringing her at her sleeping-time, so that she was easier to take than most grown-up people are". The letter concludes with a characteristically evasive subscription: "is it the right thing to send love to a person, & then sign yourself 'yours truly'? I doubt it – I think a letter should warm up towards the end, & not cool down ...".

GEORGINA BALFOUR WAS ALSO THE RECIPIENT OF AN 1865 SUPPRESSED ALICE. In a letter dated 14 November 1865, Carroll asks that she send her copy back as "the book was so badly printed" (see Cohen, p. 80). Cohen, Letters of Lewis Carroll pp. 96-98.

A RARE IMAGE that was used as a poster for the first theatrical production of Alice in December 1886. Falconer Madan described the poster (more accurately a theater "filmsey" or an image printed on very thin rice paper) at the Lewis Carroll exhibition at Bumpus in 1932, "Both Alice and Looking-Glass are drawn upon. Perhaps only two copies survived". This etching appears to be a separately published item using the same image, probably issued as a print for the drawing room or pursery.

AN UNRECORDED AND POSSIBLY UNIQUE ITEM, not listed institutionally or previously at auction. The original drawing is now in the Morgan Library, gifted from Arthur Houghton Jr.'s important Lewis Carroll Collection. "Alice in Wonderland: A Dream Play, in two Acts" opened at the Prince of Wales Theatre two days before Christmas, 1886. Carroll saw it on 30 December for the first time. "The first act ('Wonderland') goes well, specially the Mad Tea Party," he wrote in his diary. "...The second act was flat. The two queens... were very bad... and the 'Walrus', etc., had no definite finale. But, as a whole, the play seems a success." The review in the January issue of *Theatre* agreed that the production was "a wonderful and surprising success". The play ran for fifty performances, closing on 26 February 1887.


A unique prototype celestial globe, replacing the familiar constellations with characters or objects from *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* and *Through the Looking-Glass*. The gores on this globe were hand-done in watercolor and not printed. Approximately 33" in diameter. Globe is on manufacturer's original custom-made chess-piece stand (stand is wooden and metal, and hand-painted with manufacturer's hallmark on base). Total height with stand: approximately 72".

This beautiful and grand globe was made by the venerable globe-makers, Greaves & Thomas, as a prototype for future, smaller globes (although they have recently begun to make larger versions). This globe re-creates the dream-like features in Carroll's *Alice* books. Some of the substituted constellations include: Aquarius is now the Mad Hatter holding his teapot, Pisces are the Fish Footmen, Taurus is the Mock Turtle, Aries is the sheep from the shop, Gemini are Tweedledee and Tweedledum (naturally), Cancer is the crab from the Caucus Race, Leo is the Lion (again, naturally), Virgo (the virgin) is Alice, Libra is the King of Hearts, Scorpio is the lobster, Sagittarius is the White Knight on his horse, and Capricorn is the goat from the railway carriage, and many others.
